GRIDATORIAL

Last month we tried out a slightly different format fot the AJ puzzle, which found favour with some of our members but was disliked by others. Thank you to those members who expressed an opinion on our efforts to meet your needs. Without repeating all the comments it seems that the balance of opinion is that adequate space for jottings is appreciated on all grid pages. With this in mind we have tried a compromise solution for the AJ, which we hope will make the majority of members happy.

Thinking about the formatting of the magazine has raised other issues in members' minds and made us aware that some features haven't changed since much earlier days. For instance, while there was a clear use for the page of blank grids when puzzles were completed by hand and mailed to the adjudicator, there are now only two or three members who use mail entries. Is there still value in including a page of grids, or has it passed its use-by-date? We don't know what members may use the grids for, or whether it is just an additional consumer of ink and paper when you print the magazine? Do let us have your views, via an ACCOLADE "General comment", so that we can meet your wishes.

FROM THE ADJUDICATOR

I don't know about you, but this winter seems to be long and freezing! The temperatures have been stuck in single figures here in the national capital. Prime conditions for curling up in front of a fire with a glass of red and a good crossword!

Slot 1: It is a rare occasion that ESTRAL is the entry point for any puzzle, but it was for my solving of the theme words. The 12 unclued lights each contained the letters AELRST, doubtless chosen by *Bogeyman* for their high anagrammability. I expect many solvers had all the clued clues solved before entering any of the theme words. RELAST was accepted for the intended RESALT at 5 ac. In 17-across, CLASP and CLAMP were both acceptable.

Slot 2: The trickiness of T-boy in 9dn's AVIATE did not go unnoticed, where "away" = A+VIA. This was a particularly well-solved puzzle. RESERVOIR and SHARP were good clues.

Slot 3: Lexi Conner's puzzle was challenging enough to elicit several one-off solving errors. Favoured clues were CRIMEA, WISE, STEW and REALITIES. WE'RE [All of us are showered without shoes on] was a cheeky, clever clue. Unlike Slot 1, CHAMPS and CLASPS were not interchangeable for the intended "parties" (CAMPS) around "central Highlands" (L).

Slot 4: *InGrid's* grid was a challenging one for solvers but, whatever challenges it presented, they were well overcome by solvers. The main problem was the hidden reversal XEROXES. (... doesn't a solving mistake always seem to feel worse when the answer was sitting on the page staring at you the whole time?).

Slot 5: Finally, *Nigrum Cattus'* baize-infuse homage to Pot Black didn't seem to 'break' anyone...on the contrary, plenty of 147s scored here. The clues for POCKET, RIDOTTO and SEPPUKU were all remarked upon.

On the whole, it was a really well-solved month, with no diabolical clues or thematic errors.


Compiler's observations




