KA will have you scratching your head with an interestingly-formatted (but nevertheless solvable) AJ and Crowsman conducts you on a tour of (some of the) USA. CT treats us to a fairly tricky puzzle in slot 6 and we feature a feast of fifteen-letter clues in Crowsman's Corner. Child's Play makes a welcome return with one of his ingenious quizzes, which we are sure you will enjoy.

FROM THE ADJUDICATOR

The January edition of Crozworld presented a great start to 2025 with a brilliant selection of puzzles eagerly embraced by our members. Clearly it is time to put the Christmas tree away and get on with the serious business of crossword solving!

Slot 1: Bogeyman kicked off the year with a cleverly devised Christmas theme which was well received despite presenting difficulties for some solvers. By far the biggest pitfall was ROSY which generated 15 occurrences of ROSE. ON THE AIR for IN THE AIR was another dot loser for 2 solvers. BARBECUE and BARBEQUE were both accepted spellings.

Slot 2: ZINZAN presented a challenging puzzle with the theme 'MASH' very much appreciated by fans of that TV series. The main traps encountered were AGAR for IGOR (9 occurrences) and RADII for RATIO (7 occurrences). POTTER (referring to Col. Potter in MASH) produced a variety of solutions: 3 of PUTTER and 1 each of BUTLER, MOTHER and PUTTED.

Slot 3: Crow-boy gave us plenty to think about with this one. The NINA (MERRY CHRISTMAS) not being readily apparent, was brilliantly constructed by the last letters of the across clues. The key to this was in the title "Ultimate Epistles (Last Letters) for NINA". Hats off to those who spotted it. The main dot blasters were ESSAYS for ASSAYS (17) and AMARETTO for AMARETTI (8).

Slot 4: MANVERU presented his usual polished rendition of the AJ, which elicited many very positive comments. The mysterious NINA of ZEPHYR, across the top, was somewhat intriguing for some, one solver commenting that the puzzle was 'Not a breeze'. Three dots were lost by the spelling error XYLINE for XYLENE amongst a variety of one-off errors.

Slot 5: VALKYRIE gave us an enjoyable but quite challenging job with this one. The frequent porcine references produced several appreciative comments demonstrating the popularity of pigs! The main pitfalls were: SATIATED for SATIABLE (6 occurrences), SWALLOW for SPARROW (5 occurrences), EXPEND for EXPAND (4 occurrences), REHEARSE FOR clueless (4 occurrences) and SLEIGH for SLEDGE (3 occurrences).





Compiler's observations

We decided to accept LONE PARENT as well as the intended solution, SOLE PARENT: LONE PARENT is clearly an accepted term that fits both the definition and wordplay. Of the three errors with more than one occurrence (each having 2 proponents), FREEBEE and DOODAH are both alternative spellings of the correct solution but fail to comply fully with the wordplay. The third error, KEY PIECE, looks to be a bit of a guess.
