The huge boab trees which had to be relocated because of bridge building, and which were transported from the top of the continent, were thriving and spectacular. Down to work.

**Slot 1:** This puzzle was generally well received with not too many problems. I am sure that those who leave blanks must wonder where they went wrong never realising that they have been so careless.

**Slot 2**: Solvers enjoyed the theme of this puzzle. 5dn was not a popular clue and ten members made a mistake when they put SISS for SIST. Five had MISSING instead of GINSENG for 11ac.

**Slot 3:** 1dn caused some grief – several members had SKY RIDERS instead of SKY DIVERS. I could not find SKY RIDERS anywhere in the usual reference books and it does not fit the clue anyway, ie various = divers

**Slot 4:** SOCIALIZE or SOCIALISE? Answers are split about fifty/fifty and I have accepted both as correct. One had QUAHOUG for QUAHAUG and two had ZYMADES for ZYMASES.

**Slot 5:** Everyone loves *Praxis* and I am no exception so all is forgiven for the little error with the anagram at 16ac. There were several incorrect entries for VIVDA at 14ac, an ENTASIS for ECTASIS, INCI for INTI, various spellings for SALVOR and other one-off mistakes for other words.

**COTM:** All Slots received COTM nominations and members submitted 35 votes in all. Slot 4 received the most votes and the 'B' clue BROLGAS got the blue ribbon closely followed by the second place-getter DISCO in Slot 3, 23dn. Congratulations, Doug, for winning the Clue of the Month.

#### DOUG BUTLER RETIRES:

Doug has retired from Flinders University after 50 years behind the soldering iron and screwdriver. He was born and grew up in Adelaide, starting work with the PMG dept in 1960, back when it was considered OK for Government to own essential businesses and train boys into useful occupations. Eventually he was sent to Darwin to work on the high power transmitters of Radio Australia. He and his wife Paulina were happily bringing up their two boys when Cyclone Tracy struck, leaving them intact but their house gone. They spent the next seven years living in a double-decker bus rebuilding in their spare time as finances permitted. Then came the opportunity to work at Jabiru with the distinguished researchers at the Office of the Supervising Scientist. The work was great and the surroundings sensational, but the boys fell badly behind in their schooling and all attempts to improve the situation failed dismally. They moved back to Adelaide and after a few false starts Doug was employed in 1988 by Flinders University. He's managed to make contributions in various twigs of science including AA spectroscopy, thermoluminescence, cosmic ray astronomy, DNA


amplification and GFP visualization. During this time, his twin interests of word puzzles and BASIC programming have (with many thousands of hours of harmless drudgery) produced *AxWord*, a program of considerable interest to word lovers of all shades, but particularly crossworders. 
